

<u>Our Impact 2023</u>

Engagement

We have engaged 100 students 10-17 years old, and 10 teachers in creating an ambient learning atmosphere under the Climate Talking Ambiance(CTA) project

100 tree seedlings were given to learners and 75% of them are growing, and children are taking care of them

Education

The improved reading culture among children in our project school; 5 in 10 children reading and interpreting signposts in the compound compared to 2 in 10 initially.

It is a right to advocate for children's rights and take a stand against mistreatment and violations.

Empowerment

Education on children's rights and responsibilities

50% of Children gained a deeper understanding of their rights and entitlements as human beings and the importance of being treated with fairness and equity.

THE CLIMATE TALKING AMBIANCE PROJECT PHASE 1



Over 600 pupils are enrolled at the beginning of the year. In primary four, the enrollment is about 163 students, but less than 50 learners remain and take their final primary examinations after 3 years. This is linked to several factors including student and teacher absenteeism, malnutrition, and a rigid curriculum.

These factors stem from climate change and unpredictable weather events, which are a pivotal determinant of socio-economic transformation in rural communities that predominantly rely on agricultural practices to sustain livelihoods.

The effects of climate change have long-term impacts on children's health and future thus achieving quality education in rural communities, becomes a challenge that never dies.

How about a Climate Talking Ambiance? 1

What keeps our students out of school is mainly hunger at home and school. Their immediate solution is to opt out of school to garden longer hours in preparation for the next seasons, charcoal burning for extra income, and thus the growing malnutrition among young people and less time dedicated to school.

However, if students understand the root cause, they can be key change agents in transforming this unfortunate trend.



Our Success

Though the project is still ongoing, we managed to register success; We have engaged 100 students 10-17 years old, and 10 teachers in creating an ambient learning atmosphere;

- greening the school compound; fruit trees, hedges, flowers
- School garden demo
- give-away of vegetable and fruit tree seedlings to 50 children
- Written & colorful Posters on global and local statistics of climate change effects on food, and call-to-action.

Learning to grow vegetables differently

With 35 participants, learners at Nakivubo C/U Primary School took the initiative to learn different ways of gardening especially vegetables that they usually grow on a seasonal basis thus not having enough vegetables for home consumption and others not having at all till the rainy season.

Our main goal for the School garden was to grow vegetables all season round. This would mean learning from school and returning to practice within our own homes.

With the school garden, learners were taught how to adjust to the changing climate within food systems and the value of nutrition from vegetables

Gardening and Climate action in Wamulongo village

Climate Adaptation Campaign in Wamulongo Primary School through Gardening

In the Wamulongo community Busoga region, parents believe that they have small plots of land and they can only use the space to grow staple foods - sweet potatoes hence more potatoes are harvested but without accompaniment to the dish hence the idea of vegetable compound gardens and integration. As Kichini Gardeners, we were invited to the school to share with the community small-scale gardening and climate adaptation for enhanced resilience.

The garden demo setup was attended by 20 parents and 40 pupils given seeds and seedlings to establish their first vegetable gardens within the compound. The goal was to empower the Wamulongo community with small-scale climate-smart vegetable gardening techniques




WEBINAR SERIES -STORYTELLING

>>> INTRODUCTION

World Children's Day is observed every November 20th, representing a solemn reminder and celebration of children's rights worldwide. The day champions the rights, voices and lives of children. It's not just about celebration, but about addressing the myriad of challenges children face globally (SDG Resource Centre)

On 20th November, Nakivubo C/U Primary School in partnership with Kichini Gardeners Initiative, commemorated the World Children's Day under the theme: "For Every Child, Every Right!"

World Children's Day is UNICEF's annual day of action for children, by children, marking the adoption of the Convention on the Rights of the Child. Addressing Challenges: From climate change, education and mental health, to ending racism and discrimination.

Recognizing: children and young people are raising their voices on the issues that matter to their generation and calling for adults to create a better future.

On this World Children's Day, Nakivubo C/U pupils are raising their voices on the effect of climate change on their food security and mental well-being.





WHY COMMEMORATE WITH NAKIVUBO PUPILS?

Students in Nakivubo C/U Primary school are among the children in this world who are faced with challenges that force them to grow up faster than their age and enjoy less of their childhood like other children across the planet. In their community they face challenges ranging from food insecurity, education inequities to increasing poverty which leaves them in a state that not only exposes them to adulthood when still very young but also threatens their mental health. Early exposure to these experiences frustrates quality of life, undermines beliefs, and poisons attitude and behavior.

With the increasing impacts of climate change on food security, inequalities, poverty they are susceptible to hunger and malnutrition, violence and dropping out school which leaves SDG4 attainment at an arm's length. On a sad note, the majority of these students have never heard about Children's day and their rights as they transition into adulthood.

>>> CHILDREN'S RIGHTS

- 1. Respect for children's views,
- 2. Access to information,
- 3. Protection from violence,
- 4. Protection from discrimination especially Children with disabilities,
- 5. Good Health, water, food, environment,
- 6. Access to Food, clothing, a safe home,
- 7. Access to education: Every child has the right to an education.
- 8. Rest, play, culture, arts: Every child has the right to rest, relax, play,
- 9.Protection from harmful work: Children have the right to be protected from doing work that is dangerous or bad for their education, health or development.
- 10.Protection from sexual abuse: The government should protect children from sexual exploitation (being taken advantage of) and sexual abuse, including by people forcing children to have sex for money, or making sexual pictures or films of them.

Protection from exploitation: Children have the right to be protected from all other kinds of exploitation

>>> CHILDREN'S DIALOGUE

This session was led by Ms. Nagudi Irene, with the following questions;

- 1. Who's a child?
- 2. What do we understand about children's rights?
- 3. Why should we honor children's rights?

In conclusion we agreed Children's rights are human rights. Children must be treated with equality, respect and dignity, not because they are "the future", but because they are human beings today. And understanding our rights as children is key to future development of our societies and the generations to come after us.

>>> MENTAL AND SOCIAL WELLBEING OF CHILDREN

This activity was shared by Dr. Kayondo Moses, children need to understand that they have a right to mental and social wellbeing within their families and communities and should be in a position to tell when their mental health is being stepped on. In situations where they feel their mental health is being jeopardized, having a relative or a teacher they can talk to, can help them survive the consequences such as suicide, running away from home and so on.

>>> PHYSICAL WELLBEING OF CHILDREN

The session was held by Ms. Asianzu Blessing, sharing how food is a key component for the well-being of children as it contributes to their right growth of the body and mind. To fight off malnutrition among children, children should understand their right to healthy and safe food. And should be entitled to at least 2 meal a day that are fully balanced in nutrients, to reduce on the malnutrition cases arising each day among children and adolescent girls which makes them stay at home

>>> CONCEAL ON CHILDREN'S RIGHTS

The sum up on children's rights was conducted by Hon. Fatuma, who shared to children how their rights really matter and they should not stay silent when they see that their rights are being violated. The authorities are readily available and much willing to defend the rights of children as per the

constitution of Uganda. No child's rights should be violated for cases of being young or not having a voice because of age. Children are also humans and their rights should by protected and respected.



EMPOWERING STUDENTS WITH KNOWLEDGE ON SUSTAINABLE FOOD GROWING ON THIS WORLD FOOD DAY - NAKIVUBO C/U PRIMARY SCHOOL, KAYUNGA DISTRICT

12th October 2023

>>> INTRODUCTION

Kichini Gardeners Initiative commemorated World Food Day in partnership with Nakivubo C/U Primary School, Kayunga district on the 12th of October 2023.

Food insecurity is a common public health problem and a major constraint to educational attainments among school children and adolescents in developing countries. Students from food-insecure households are more likely to be absent from school due to exposure to infectious diseases and socio-emotional difficulties compared to their peers from food-secure households. This not only affects the normal physical growth of young children but also adversely affects their intellectual capacity and social skills thus having a significant association with students' poor school attendance.

Imagine 5 out of every 10 students miss school, to help out with the home gardening! Nakivubo C/U Primary School is a government-aided institution situated in Nakivubo village, Kayunga district, serving over 800 students from families dependent on agriculture for their livelihoods. The changing seasons, marked by extended droughts, often force these children to miss school to help with farm work.

This has greatly contributed to the learning impairment of learners in classrooms because they lose concentration and in the end are not able to comprehend and internalize what has been taught.



WHY COMMEMORATE WITH NAKIVUBO PUPILS?

Pupils of Nakivubo C/U come from families that are agriculture-based but challenged by the longer droughts and unpredictable weather conditions the community experiences. The children normally fall victim to missing school to help out with the garden preparations in preparation for the predicted rainy seasons accompanied with the one meal the children receive in a day. Children missing school, neither builds them nor guarantees a fruitful future rather making them susceptible to the adverse effects of dropping out of school such as teenage pregnancies, drug abuse and anti-social behaviors among others. By sharing knowledge with these children, we are creating awareness about climate change's impacts on water and food security and how children can respond to them by transferring the knowledge back home to practically do it with their parents.

> 95% of our food is produced on land and all begins with soil and water

>>> THE IMPORTANCE OF WATER AND HOW TO CONSERVE IT

The children shared that water is important for our survival as it is key;

- Irrigating the plants
- Household chores

Reuse of water

Water from dishes reused for other house chores like mopping and water used to wash food can be reused for irrigation of plants

Harvest rain water

Instead of leaving it to flow, if learners can collect the water it can be used for irrigation in the gardens during the hot days when plants are water stressed

Don't play with water

5-TIPS TO

CONSERVE WATER

With the school borehole, learners learnt to use a container to tap flowing water instead of washing hands with water flowing to waste. the tapped water can be used for other meaningful uses.



Capture and store water (stormwater) in our gardens

If water is left to flow, we are not only losing the water but the top soils as well. Learners were taught how to capture and store water in the garden through the use of ridges and swales relating to the ridges we created in our previous school garden space.

Mulching of our Gardens

With mulching, we are in a position to conserve moisture within the soils that the plants can take in their processes of food production. Further use of plastic bottles especially in their small gardens of vegetables to minimize the water used for irrigation.

5-TIPS TO CONSERVE WATER

How we conserve water in our Nursery beds;

With the school's set up nursery beds, we dug trenches that allowed water to flow through and be sipped into the ground steadily. Then cover the beds with nets where the drips of water surface the whole ground of plants slowly and less water is used while protecting the plants.



CHILDREN OF NAKIVUBO PRIMARY SCHOOL SENDING OUT CALL-TO-ACTION MESSAGES

As an organization, We believe that when we connect, we learn and eventually we can lead. Formulated by the children, **4 teams took on identities of different foods, Sukuma wiki, Rice, Apple, and Jackfruit,** which they based on to write and send out call-to-action messages to inspire peers and general public.

Learners learn to communicate to the world calling the different people to support their cause and transform the communities we live in.



Kichini Gardeners Initiative in 2023 estimated an annual budget operation of USD6000, however we managed to raise USD2000, which we used on our expenditure - Events, Climate Education and School garden setups









Challenges
